appliqué	a sewing technique where fabric shapes are attached onto the main fabric
evaluate	to decide how well something works and what could be improved
join	something that joins two pieces together
needle	a thin pointed piece of metal or plastic that is used to sew
pattern	a template from which the <b>parts</b> of a garment are traced onto <b>fabric</b> before being cut out and assembled
puppet	a doll or a toy that is moved by a hand
seam	a row of stitches joining two pieces of fabric.
sew	to join pieces of fabric with stitches.
