
Port Sunlight is a village on the Wirral Peninsula. It was built in 1888 by the Lever Brothers to house workers of its soap factory. The name comes from Lever Brothers' most popular brand of soap: Sunlight.

William Hesketh Lever



He was born in 1851 and died in 1925. He was an English businessman who was also known by the name 'Lord Leverhulme'.

- William and his brother James entered the soap business in 1885.
- The brothers teamed up with a chemist, who invented the process which resulted in a new type of soap.
- The soap was named "Sunlight Soap". They built a large factory in Port Sunlight.



William Lever believed that the health and welfare of his workers was important so built Port Sunlight for them.

He wanted good conditions for working people which was rare at this time.

Most working people lived in over crowed cities, cramped houses and were paid very little with no time or freedom for living.
